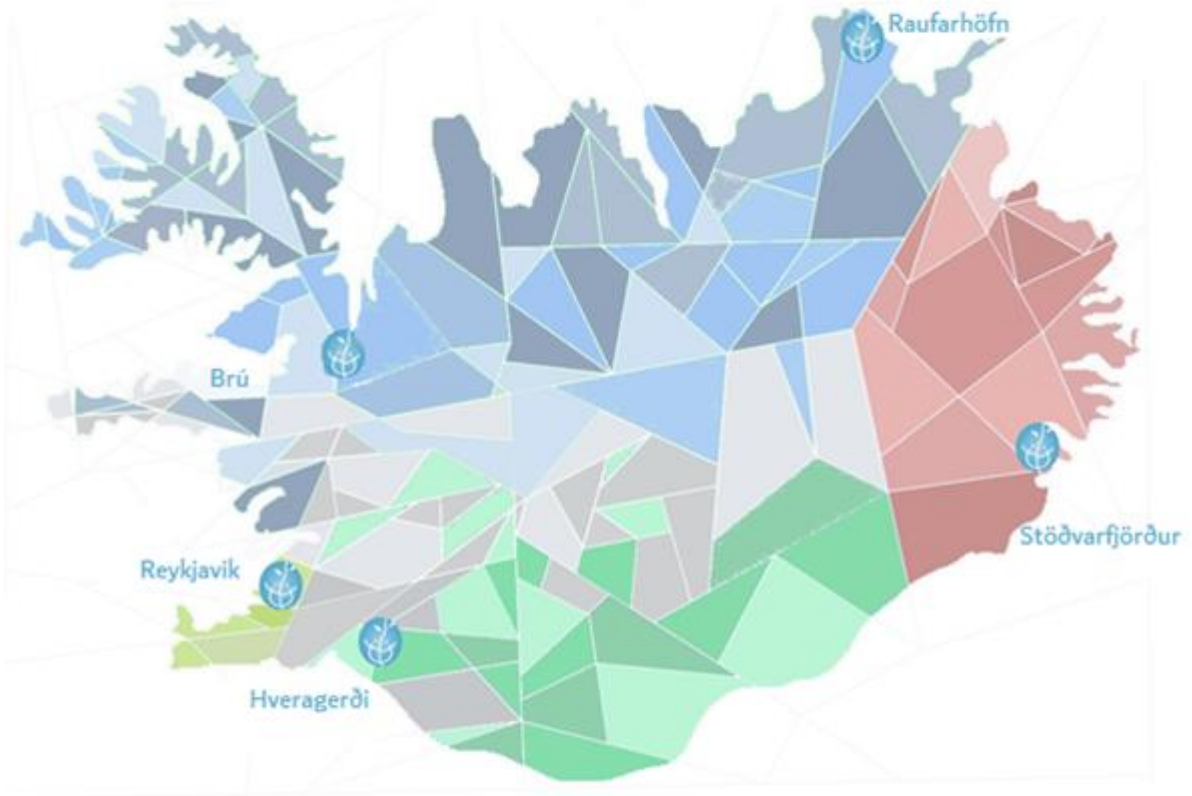

The town had a population of approximately 1400 when it was granted municipal status. Now, a century later, the population has exploded. However, the town retains its small-town air, its rural aura and its heart - which is not surprising given that the town prides itself on the largest unbroken neighborhood of corrugated iron-clad timber houses in Iceland. The town has grown quickly over the past few years and the new neighborhoods have attracted a diverse community of people who understand that Hafnarfjörður offers a great range of commercial outlets and services, an active cultural life and plenty of activities.

The town is famous for having one of Iceland's largest settlements of elves, dwarves and the so-called 'Hidden Folk.' Centuries-old folklore has it that whole clans of such beings reside in the rocks that make up part of the town's centre. We do not doubt this at all. Though elves are visible only to those with second sight, many Icelanders believe in their existence. Indeed, there are many stories to support this belief and reports of cases where the construction of new roads or housing developments were hindered by strange happenings abound. Hidden Folk are highly respected all over Iceland, especially in Hafnarfjörður. There is even a Hidden Worlds tour that takes to their home sites, including Helligsgerdi Park and the base of the cliff Hamarinn, which is said to be home to the Royal Family of the Hidden Folk. Along the way, the guide relates ancient folk tales of the magical hidden worlds and narrates how the town developed in harmony with the Hidden Folk.

Work: Volunteers will have environmental tasks in different areas in and around Hafnarfjordur, for example cleaning the coastline, planting trees, taking down old fences, removing lupines or other plants and fixing hiking paths.

Our work will also depend on weather conditions, which is why we have to be flexible. You should be prepared for unfriendly weather, but hopefully, the weather will be nice most of the time. This is a perfect camp for people who like outdoor work and physical challenges. Working hours are about 6 hours a day, 5 days a week.

Within the project we will have educational sessions to learn about green energy, sustainable householding, waste treatment, nutrition, the effects of consumption and lots more. If you want to change something, develop solutions or inspire others, you must understand the issues and tasks first. In addition to the theoretical part we are going to practice sustainable work. For example, planting trees is one of the main exercises of the camps. Planting trees becomes a very useful action against climate change because trees absorb carbon dioxide, clean the air and prevent erosions. Take part in this promising project and spring into action against climate change!

Leisure: Worldwide Friends volunteers have free access to the local geothermal-heated swimming pool in Hafnarfjordur. Traditionally, natural pools have played an important social role in Icelandic culture. Most Icelandic pools offer indoor and outdoor swimming, as well as hot tubs and saunas or steam rooms.

WF Iceland will also organise reasonably priced weekend excursions to some of the most popular, beautiful areas and natural wonders that Iceland has to offer. Excursions include unique Icelandic sights such as glacial lagoons, waterfalls, volcanic and

Accommodation and Food: Worldwide Friends volunteers stay in a community building offering basic sleeping and cooking facilities. Volunteers need to bring their own sleeping bag and towels, but mattresses and bed linens are provided. Wireless internet access is provided free of charge. The accommodation is located within short walking distance of many urban amenities, including banks, pharmacies, supermarkets, public swimming pools, restaurants, cafes, libraries, theatres, shops, museums, and bus stations.

Food is included for the duration of the workcamp, however, everyone is expected to do their fair share of the cooking and cleaning. Since it is always nice to try new and different dishes, volunteers are encouraged to bring along their favourite recipes (and spices) from home!

Requirements: There are no requirements for this camp

Terminal: Flights arrive at Keflavik International Airport (KEF), just south of Reykjavik. The meeting point is at 08.00 am at the first day of the camp in Tjarnargata 11 which is the city hall of Reykjavik

Additional information: There is an extra participation fee of 350 euros for this workcamp. The fee includes a minibus trip from the meeting point of the camp to the accommodation and the Golden Circle South Iceland excursion.

WF342 Preventing the erosion in Reykjanes peninsula **11/07 – 24/07** **ENVI/MANU** **15 vols**

Project Location: The work will take place in the Reykjanes peninsula which is located on a drift zone, between two continents, the North American plate and the Eurasian plate. It is a unique site where you can find different elements that exist because of the drift zone; geothermal energy and lava fields. There you can find a lot of natural phenomenon such as Gunnhver hot spring, Krysuvik, the bridge between continents and Hafnaberg sea cliffs.

Project location: Hveragerði is a small town of about 1,700 inhabitants that lies some 45 km east of Reykjavík. This friendly little community sits on top of a highly active geothermal field, which provides heat for hundreds of greenhouses where fruits, flowers and vegetables are produced throughout the year. Even bananas grow in these greenhouses! The name Hveragerði means ‘hot springs garden.’ Geothermal energy is Hveragerði’s lifeblood, and you probably won’t find such a natural wonder in the middle of a populated area anywhere else in the world. Nearby you will find an even more geothermally active site: Gufudalur, the lovely ‘Steam Valley’ behind the town. This whole valley is full of hot springs, geysers, mud pots, fumaroles and steaming vents.

Our host is a non-profit organisation called the NLFI Rehabilitation and Health Clinic, which is part of the Natural Health Association of Iceland. The Westman Islands consist of a group of fifteen islands, which are situated within a short distance off the south coast of Iceland. They are named after the Nordic settlers in the country, namely the Irish, which is why they are called the "westmen" (the men from the west). All islands were created in submarine volcanic eruptions during a comparatively recent geological time period. The colourful town, the beautiful bird cliffs, the new lava and volcanoes and the landscape in general give the islands a scenic interest as varied in character as any in the country. Heimaey is the largest and only inhabited island in the group and Iceland's longest off-shore island with an area of 13.4 km². In the area, you can find some of the historical places in Iceland, for example, Þingvellir, which is by far Iceland's most famous historic site and one of the two places in Iceland in the UNESCO World Heritage list.

Nowhere on earth is the junction between the European and American tectonic plates in the Earth's crust as clear as in the southwest and at Þingvellir. The plates diverge here by as much as 2 cm per year, but the gap is constantly being filled, as volcanoes have been erupting regularly throughout Iceland's history.

The town has been growing and prospering since the early 1900's and is almost completely self-sufficient thanks to the fishing industry. Sitting in the middle of nowhere, away from other villages and communities, the town is equipped with all the necessary facilities and stores: a bakery, a local dairy, supermarkets, banks, a post office, a school, a sports hall, a swimming pool, a church, a hospital, a harbour, an airstrip, a hotel, a jazz club, a rescue centre, etc. As a matter of fact, it has all the services and professionals you would expect in a larger town, with the exception of an optician! In the east of the town, a wildlife reserve and a large recreational area face the ocean. In the lower section of the reserve called Hagi lies the famous Páskahellir (Easter Cave), a rock vault over the shore. Neskaupstaður can be reached only by driving through a one-way tunnel over the highest year-round pass in Iceland.

Eistnaflug is a metal festival in Iceland that has taken place annually since the summer of 2005. Eistnaflug is an indoor festival situated in Neskaupstaður, a quaint little town located on the Norðfjörður fjord on the Eastern coast of Iceland, 700 km away from Reykjavik. It started out as a small one-day metal festival on 27 August 2005, but has since grown into a four-day festival where metal, hardcore, punk, rock and indie bands share the stage. The line-up usually consists of 30-40 bands, most of which are Icelandic.

Musically, Eistnaflug is also a remarkable melting pot, with a few selected foreign acts going up against a massive selection of musicians Iceland's music scene has to offer. There are no boundaries – from indie rock and hardcore to black metal – everything is accepted and embraced at Eistnaflug.

A wide and untouched open area surrounds the village with a lot of birds and varied vegetation.

Please note that the schedule for the camps will be flexible and made according to the weather forecast and road conditions with a short notice.

Project location: This camp takes place in five different places in Iceland. Reykjavik the capital, Brú Sustainable center in the West, Stodvarfjordur in the East and Raufarhöfn in the North of Iceland, so the participants will get the opportunity to go around during the camp.

Brú - Worldwide Friends Iceland is opening in May a centre of environment and sustainability near to the crossroads to the West, South and North of Iceland. The centre called BRÚ is in the area of Hrutafjordur which is a 36 km long fjord in Hunathing vestra. In the neighbourhood you can find a lot of pure and unspoiled nature, beaches full of driftwood, Snæfellsnes peninsula, glaciers in the highlands, waterfalls, strong rivers, canyons and craters. The purpose of the centre is to protect the nature in the area and to raise the awareness of sustainability among the locals and the visitors which are coming to the area. The house is more than 1.000 m² and has 16 double rooms, two kitchens, several bathrooms and common areas, rooms for workshops and galleries. It has its own generator to produce electricity for heating and daily use.

Stodvarfjordur: Scoured by Ice Age glaciers, the dramatic east coast boasts long, narrow fjords with steep sides and jagged peaks which contrast with inland fertile farmlands. Natural harbours depict postcard-like fishing villages and seemingly never-ending roads cross the region, providing beautiful views.

“Fjarðabyggð” is an association of villages in the Eastern fjords of Iceland. It includes the towns of Eskifjörður, Fáskrúðsfjörður, Mjóifjörður, Neskaupstaður, Reyðarfjörður, Breiðdalsvík and Stöðvarfjörður, all tiny fishing villages with steep mountains towering just behind the houses. In this area you will see some of the features that make Iceland a unique place in the world: spectacular fjords with a rich sea life, a great variety of birdlife and countless breath-taking hiking paths. You will explore the area during your stay in the east.

Raufarhofn: The village of Raufarhöfn is the community that lies farthest north in Iceland. It is located in the eastern part of Melrakkasletta close to the Arctic Circle. The population of Raufarhöfn is about 200 and most of the people there earn their

living from fishing and fish processing. The harbor is very beautiful and partly shaped by nature itself. A wide and untouched open area surrounds the village with a lot of birds and varied vegetation. In summer one will observe wild migratory birds within the village being a part of the village life with the villagers most often waking up in the morning to the songs of birds. The coastline with its inlets and creeks is filled with driftwood and reaches out into the Arctic Sea. Away and on the surface of the sea various sea-birds will be spotted and an occasional seal. On the beach waders strut and inland on the grassy moorlands there are dozens of lakes filled with trout. In the vicinity many species of ducks, waders and species that favor heaths and moorlands may be observed.

Work: Every year WF Iceland hosts hundreds of international volunteers participating in projects all around the island. WF Iceland publishes a magazine called UNA, where people can read about the life of the organisation <https://wf.is/category/extras/>

In the beginning of the project, volunteers will receive an introduction about the tasks - afterwards we will choose a topic for the magazine. For example, planting trees is one of the main exercises of the camps. Planting trees becomes a very useful action against climate change because trees absorb carbon dioxide, clean the air and prevent erosions. They will get a hands-on instruction and experience with the tools necessary to research, compose, capture, and refine digital photographic projects. Accommodation and food: Worldwide Friends teenagers will be staying in the WF houses in Brú, Stodvarfjardur and Raufarhofn. The houses have several dormitories, big living room and fully equipped kitchen, showers and toilets. Beds are provided; however, volunteers should bring their own warm sleeping bags or borrow one from WF if they don't want to bring it. Wireless internet access is provided free of charge.

Food is included for the duration of the camp, however, everyone is expected to do their fair share of the cooking and cleaning. Since it is always nice to try new and different dishes, volunteers are encouraged to bring along their favourite recipes from home!

Language: A basic knowledge of English is required for this workcamp.

Requirements: No special requirements

Terminal: Intl. Airport: Keflavík (KEF), Reykjavík.

Flights arrive at Keflavik International Airport (KEF), just south of Reykjavik. The meeting point is at 08.00 am at the first day of the camp in Tjarnargata 11 which is the city hall of Reykjavik. Worldwide Friends can also pick up the teenagers at the Keflavik airport free of charge.

Additional information: There is an extra participation fee of 600 euros for this workcamp. The fee includes the Iceland around tour. If the teenagers arrive earlier to Iceland or leave later than we can offer them accommodation for 30 euro per night and meals are included.

We will drive along road number one. This trip includes several stops where you will discover unique Icelandic sights, such as glacial lagoons, waterfalls, volcanic and geothermal areas, glaciers, lava fields, hot-springs, rhyolite mountain ranges, steam-vents or even icebergs.

General information about our international workcamps:

Study theme 2020: This year all our projects will have a special focus on how to prevent global warming in our in our daily life. This means that the camps will be a mixture of practical work and environmental education.

Age limit: In general, volunteers should be at least 18 years old. There is no maximum age limit for the majority of our workcamps. We also host camps for teenagers 14 to 18 years old.

Work: Workcamps typically last 10 to 14 days. Working hours are usually about 20-35 hours a week (five to seven hours a day, five days a week). Any exceptions will be noted in the project descriptions.

Accommodation: In Reykjavik in a farm located in the outskirts of Reykjavik. In the east, they will stay in the Worldwide Friends' house in Stöðvarfjörður. In the North the volunteers will stay in the Worldwide Friends in Raufarhofn. In Hveragerði the volunteers stay in a bungalow with double rooms. We also run camps in Brú in Hrótafjörður where we have our sustainable centre in the North west of Iceland

Food: Food will be provided; however, volunteers are expected to do their fair share of the cooking and cleaning.

Camp language: English is the language spoken in our camps. Volunteers are required to have at least a basic knowledge of the English language. Should the language requirements be higher, this will be specified in the workcamp description.

Camp leaders: There are always one, two or even more leaders for each camp, depending on the size of the group. Leaders represent the link between the hosting community and the group of volunteers. They coordinate the work, organise free time activities and plan excursions, shopping and cooking sessions. Apart from these additional responsibilities, they are equal to the other volunteers. Most of our camp leaders are from other countries, as we are very open-minded in hosting international leaders from other organisations. All our leaders start their program with one week of training.

Extra participation fee: We charge an extra participation fee for all our camps. Volunteers are expected to pay the workcamp fee in cash (EUR, USD or ISK) upon their arrival to the camp.

WF Iceland charges a participation fee for the following reasons:

- a. Lack of support from the government and other sources;
- b. For some of our workcamps, WF must supply food, which is quite expensive in Iceland compared to other European countries;
- c. For most of our workcamps located in Reykjavik, WF has to cover both food and accommodation costs;
- d. Most of our partner organizations in other countries cover their administration costs through the fees they charge the volunteers they send abroad. We do not send enough volunteers abroad in order to cover our administrative expenses, so we need to charge a participation fee from the volunteers we receive.

Insurance: Veraldarvinir provides a third part liability during the duration of the camp. WF Iceland does not provide volunteers with a medical insurance. Therefore, we strongly recommend that the volunteers purchase insurance for their stay here in Iceland. European volunteers should bring their European Health Cards (former E111).

Some practical matters

We highly recommend volunteers to bring a sleeping bag, warm and waterproof work clothes, hiking boots and swimming suits. Volunteers are also encouraged to bring information about their country, such as photos, music, songbooks, games or musical instruments.

Volunteers with special needs: Our camps are open to everyone. If you have volunteers with special needs, please contact us. We will do our very best to find a way to host them.

We will send out detailed information sheets with practical information and camp details on the day we accept the volunteers. All our information sheets are also available online.

Arrival and departure

The first day of the camp is arrival day and the last day of the camp is a departure day. If the camp is held in the north, east or west of Iceland, we strongly recommend that volunteers arrive the day before the camp starts and depart the next day after the camp ends. However, if the camp is held in Reykjavik, volunteers can arrive the first day of the camp and depart on the last day of the camp.

Transport to the camp location:

Iceland's public transportation is expensive and not very efficient. We will arrange a minibus trip from Reykjavik to all of our workcamp locations. **The minibus fee is included in the total fee for the workcamp.**

Accommodation before and after the workcamp

WF Iceland is not offering hostel service before or after the workcamps except for the teenagers.
